# Math 3430–002, Introduction to Ordinary Differential Equations Fall 2021

**Prerequisites:** This course has as a prerequisite the courses Math 2400 Calculus 3, and Math 2130 or Math 2135 or APPM 3310 (min grade C). Similar to APPM 2360.

**Text:** "Differential Equations and their Applications", Martin Braun, Fourth Edition, Springer Verlag, 1993. We will cover most of Chapters 1 through 4 of the text. An e-copy of this book is available for download through the university library system.

Course outline: This course is meant to familiarize the student with the elements of the theory of ordinary differential equations. It gives an elementary systematic introduction to first-order scalar differential equations, nth-order linear differential equations, and n-dimensional linear systems of first-order differential equations. Additional topics are chosen from equations with regular singular points, Laplace transforms, phase plane techniques, basic existence and uniqueness, and numerical solutions. If time permits we will cover more material from the textbook, depending on the interests of the students and the instructor. Other topics will be covered as time permits.

Assessment: Grades will be assigned based on performance in homework assignments (20%), participation-based Friday worksheets the last 10-15 minutes of class (5%), two in-class midterms (22.5% each), and a final exam (30%).

**Homework:** 20% of your final grade will be come from your performance on homework, which will be assigned every week. Some, but not all, of the problems will be graded. Pdf files of your homework solutions should be uploaded to the class Canvas page by 11:59 p.m. on the homework due date. **Late homework will not be accepted**, but the two lowest grades of your homework assignments will be dropped. Friday worksheets are based on participation only, and you are allowed to miss up to 3 of them without penalty.

### Friendly advice:

- Attend class. Things will often be said in class that are not covered in the text, and participating in classroom discussions is an important part of the learning process.
- Read the book. The text is intended to be read in addition to classroom lectures, and it contains many more details and examples than are possible to cover in lectures.

- Come to my office hours in person or via ZOOM. I am happy to help you with the homework, or discuss anything we've done in class.
