Math 4001–001/Math 5001-001, Analysis II Fall 2021

Prerequisites: This course has as a prerequisite the courses Math 3001 Analysis 1, and Math 2130 or Math 2135 or APPM 3310 (min grade C).

Text: "Undergraduate Analysis", Serge Lang, Second Edition, Springer, 2005. An e-copy of this book is available for download through the university system. We will cover part of Chapter V, all of Chapter IX, all of Chapter XV, and parts of Chapters XVII and XVIII.

Course outline: This course is meant to continue to familiarize the student with the theory of functions of one or more real variables, with an initial emphasis on sequences and series of functions and different types of convergence, and with a continuation into the theory of vector-valued functions of vector variables, including the inverse function theorem and the implicit function theorem. Topics to be covered include: a rigorous treatment of infinite series of real numbers, sequences and series of functions, convergence and uniform convergence of sequences and series of functions, Taylor's Theorem, a brief review of vector spaces, in particular, *n*-dimensional Euclidean space; differentiation, including the definition of the total derivative and the chain rule; the mean value theorem, the inverse mapping theorem, and the implicit function theorem.

Assessment: Grading: Grades will be based on two midterm exams (22.5% each), one of which will be in-class and one of which will be take-home, weekly homework assignments consisting mostly of problems from the text with some in-class presentation (25%), and a comprehensive final exam (30%). Students taking Math 5001 will have some extra homeowork problems and their take-home exam will be different from those taking Math 4001.

Homework: 25% of your final grade will be come from your performance on homework, which will be assigned every week. Some, but not all, of the problems will be graded. Late homework will not be accepted, but the two lowest grades of your homework assignments will be dropped.

- Attend class. Things will often be said in class that are not covered in the text, and participating in classroom discussions is an important part of the learning process.
- **Read the book.** The text is intended to be read *in addition to* classroom lectures, and it contains many more details and examples than are possible to cover in lectures.
- **Do the homework.** Not only does it count for a significant portion of your grade, but this is one of the best ways to study and learn.
- Come to my office hours in person or via ZOOM. I am happy to help you with the homework, or discuss anything we've done in class.
