Online Homework: You will have two online homework assignments due, at 11pm on the due date, to be completed on MyMathLab. Each assignment will consist of 10 problems per section covered each worth 1 point and you may attempt each question multiple times (up until the due date) to receive credit. Late problem sets (for any reason) will be given a score of 0. There are a total of 10 assignments worth a total of 370 points. However, only the first 300 points will count.

Projects: Projects will be given every Tuesday. The projects will be an opportunity to work in groups and discuss your methods and results. Whatever problems are not completed in class are to be finished as homework and turned in at the start of class the following day. There are a total of 5 projects worth 45 points each for a total of 225. However, only the first 180 points will count. Further, 10 points of each score will be based on your attendance and participation in the class during which the project was distributed. No make-up projects are allowed for any reason.

Quizzes: Quizzes will be given approximately once a week. There are a total of 4 quizzes worth 40 points each. However, your lowest quiz score will be dropped so that the total number of possible quiz points is 120. No make-up quizzes are allowed for any reason.

Final Exam: There will be a final exam given on the last day of class, July 1, during regular class time, 9:15-10:50. You must take the final exam to pass the course. The final exam will be cumulative. During the exam, the use of notes, books, calculators, and any other resource is prohibited. The final exam is worth 150 points.
